<u>May Program</u>

Strip Canoe Construction By Sue Spray

I would like to introduce myself as your program chair for 2006 and am very happy to provide May's meeting presentation on how I built canoes such as the one in last year's Design in Wood Exhibition. The judges awarded my Mahogany Canoe #4 First Place in tradition woodworking accessories category, fair attendees voted it People's Choice and the SDFWA President chose it as First Place in the novice category. I was thrilled and honored to receive this recognition for my work.

My day job is Senior Veterinarian at the Scripps Research Institute in La Jolla. I am board certified in Comparative Medicine which is the study of comparing physiology and biology across various species including humans. I really like my day job, but I absolutely love and am fanatical about woodworking.

This obsession with woodworking began in the 6th grade when a teacher introduced me to relief carving. In junior high school, woodshop was offered to girls and I jumped at the chance. I already had had the requisite classes in home economics and really wanted to try my hand at working with wood. My mother wasn't too thrilled about the idea and reluctantly relented. I consider myself largely self taught though I have attended many seminars and classes from some of woodworking's finest craftsmen including David Marks, Sam Maloof, Frank Klauz, Sandor Nagyszalanczy, Ian Kirby and others. I really like to talk to people who are as passionate about woodworking as I am and have learned much from San Diego Fine Woodworkers members.

I first became interested in building canoes when I saw a 1990 Popular Mechanics article on cedar strip canoe building, I thought it was beautiful and wanted to build one. I did not think my skills were at an adequate level, so I cut the article out and saved it. In 1996, I pulled the article out and began construction. My first boat was completed a little over a year later. I built two more out of cedar as commissioned pieces. One hangs in a home in Del Mar, the other is owned by an avid canoeist in North Carolina. It was given to him as a gift from his wife and he uses it regularly. In 2003 I decided to build a canoe in an unconventional manner for the purpose of entering it in the Designs in Wood Exhibition at the San Diego Fair. It took 2 years to complete. I had been attending the fair for a number of years specifically to see the woodworking exhibits and was always extremely impressed with the quality of craftsmanship of the pieces. I was much honored and surprised to receive the awards for my canoe. I felt just being accepted into the exhibit was a major accomplishment.

The presentation for the May meeting is a PowerPoint presentation that covers the basics of strip canoe construction. I will go over the basic and advanced techniques including hull construction, waterproofing, and gunwale, deck and seat construction. Construction of strip canoes can be very rewarding and only requires mostly hand tools and portable power tools. I hope you will join me for an informative and education seminar. See you there!

From the President...

Entries for the Design In Wood show are now closed. It is now time for setup and we need your help. THIS IS THE LAST MEETING BEFORE THE DESIGN IN WOOD SHOW AND WE STILL NEED A LOT OF VOLUNTEERS FOR FLOOR WALKERS AND THE CHAIR SHOP.

We have about 80 open slots for floorwalkers, especially in the 7 PM to 10 PM shift. This is an easy shift to do after work. It is usually less busy and gives you more time to look over the display. Floor duty can be very rewarding and educational. You don't have to be an expert as answers on all the pieces are readily available at the front desk. It also gives you a chance to spend some time really looking over the different works on display. I know from past experience that I seem to find something new each time I go through the show. And I always learn something new about woodworking from looking over the entries. Floor walking is a very important job at the show. Interacting with the public, answering questions about the different pieces on display, signing up new members, directing people to the bathroom, etc. Besides, you get to wear one of those nice brightly colored vests that identify you as a San Diego Fine Woodworker. Seriously though, we need to protect the pieces on display and answer the many questions about the pieces on display. So please sign up if you are able. We really need your help in continuing to make this the largest and best woodworking show in the country.

The first thing we have to do is set-up. The more help we get the better. No sign up is necessary to help with set up. Of course, you get fair tickets for helping with set up. Just show up. If you have a screw gun, bring it. If not just come with a willingness to help. There is plenty to do. We will feed you and provide plenty of refreshments. The more people we have the easier it is on everyone. Set up really goes by quickly and it is a good way to meet people in the organization. We always have a good time and it is a lot of fun. Just show up and we will put you to work. Get involved and take advantage of the opportunity to work with you.

We also need volunteers to work in the 19th century cabinet shop making children's chairs. Each year we produce about 50 chairs for charity. These are hand made during the fair by our members. It is a great way to learn and practice hand tool techniques. The hand tool skills we teach you are still very important skills for today's woodworker and are necessary for any type of woodworking project, from furniture to cabinets.

Sign up sheets for all shifts are available on line at <u>www.sdfwa.org</u> and will also be available at the meeting. Use the online signup if possible. But for the computer challenged we will have sign up sheets at the meeting. ALL VOLUNTEERS RECEIVE 2 FAIR TICKETS for each shift. The more you volunteer, the more tickets you get. Work a few shifts and treat your family. Besides being a lot of fun it is a good way to get to know your fellow members. This is our big event for the year so sign up and plan to help. LEARNING FROM THE MASTERS

The Design In Wood exhibition is a show case and an inspiration for our members. The guest speaker seminar program is another event designed to educate and inspire our group. In this article I will feature a few of the earlier guest speakers and tell how this program has evolved over the years.

Our first lecture/workshop was to feature James Krenov, but at the last minute it was cancelled because of illness. So, Art Carpenter became our first nationally renowned guest speaker. On October 16th, 1982, he gave an excellent lecture and slide show that spanned his 34 year career as a designer craftsman. Art appeared on the cover of Fine Woodworking November/December 1982. James Krenov did give a program in April of 1984.

The association was introduced to Sam Maloof on March 15th 1985. We arranged a special Friday night general meeting. He gave a presentation of what he was doing and the direction he saw wood working going. That direction now known as the California Style. The group followed this meeting with a field trip to Sam's home and shop that fall.

The association hosted Frank Cummings on May 25th 1988. Frank gave an outstanding lecture and slide show of his work. His work is very artistic and superbly crafted. Frank was featured in the January 1988 issue of American Wood Turner. We also arranged a field trip to his shop at Cal. State Fullerton, where he was an instructor.

Probably the most controversial guest speaker was Wenell Castle. Wenell did work for the rich and famous on the east coast. He was commissioned to create the 500,000th Steinway piano. Castle had moved from a traditional woodworker to a contemporary artist. So by the time he spoke in San Diego on March 17-18 1989, his work was a bit far out for many of our members.

The Brian Boggs seminar, in 1996, was very unique because he not only lectured, showed slides, but he also built in two days a Kentucky mule eared ladder back chair that was raffled off at the end of the workshop. The chair went for between \$600 to \$800. It was very impressive to watch the ease and speed with which Brian worked – using the traditional chair making tools. His ladder back chair was featured in the 1995 summer issue of Fine Woodworking Home Furniture magazine.

Before 1995, our national guest speaker seminar programs were held in a variety of locations and at different times of the year. Art Carpenter appeared in a room in Balboa Park. Sam Maloof gave his presentation in a junior high school in University City. Frank Cummings spoke at a general meeting at the United Methodist Church in Clairemont. Wenell Castle gave his lecture and slide program at University City High School and the workshop was held at San Diego State University.

In 1995, I arranged for the Doug Hicks seminar to be held at the San Diego School of Creative and Performing Arts. At the time I was teaching technical theater there. We transformed the stage into a woodworking shop, used theater lighting and close-up video shown on several TV monitors. This was the birth of our present fall seminar program. Now it is even more high tech. Over the last 24 years the association has been blessed to have such master craftsmen graciously share their knowledge and skills with us.

A footnote: I would like to make a correction in my article that was printed in the March issue. Lynn Rybarczyk was the co-superintendent with Chuck Masters and not Bob Mason as was printed.
