#### ~ We need your help! ~

Aside from the elected positions we have several chair positions that need to be filled.

**Design in Wood Coordinator**: Manage the Design in Wood Show. Please contact Bob Stevenson for details. This is a paid position funded by the state.

Hoover High School has in incredible shop! All their equipment is brand new, in a brand new building that is flooded with natural light. They have a CNC machine, giant sliding table saw and tons of other equipment. There are over 30 students and only one teacher. The kids who take this class are basically handpicked through an application process to allow them into the class. These are kids that want to be there and want to learn the craft. The TA position is currently volunteer spot with the potential for

moving into a paid position if the school district approves it. This is the perfect opportunity for a retired member to get out there and help with community based learning.





Bob Reese has made an arrangement with Suffolk Machinery for SDFWA members to make a bulk purchase of the highly regarded Timber Wolf band saw blades at a 30% discount from the regular price.

If you wish to purchase one or more blades go to the Timber Wolf website; <a href="http://timberwolfblades.com/">http://timberwolfblades.com/</a>

After you select the blade or blades and the length you want you will see the regular price. The number of Teeth Per Inch (TPI) is important in performance. At least 3 teeth should be in the stock. Thus you

should not use 4 TPI on stock less than 3/4 TPI of 4-14 can be used on 3/4" or thicker stock. The lower the TPI the faster and the rougher the cut. For re-sawing 3-4 TPI are recommended for up to about 8 inches; a 1/2" blade works well.

#### Do not proceed to check out.

# CHOOSING THE PROPER BAND SAW BLADE LUBRICATION

**NEVER USE WATER** as a lubricant on band saw blades. Water is **NOT** a lubricant and is the **WRONG** thing to use for many reasons.

I. For the woodworker using I" and I ¼" bands, not only is water unacceptable as a lubricant, but it also rusts the bands causing deep pitting, and inappropriate chip swelling. This prematurely destroys the body of the band and its gullets. It also dry rots your tires or V-belts.

For proper lubrication mix **HIGH ADHESION CHAIN SAW BAR OIL**, with 50% kerosene or diesel fuel. Apply the solution with a spray bottle to BOTH sides of the band about once every four minutes, while the machine is running. When this lubrication is applied, the sound of cutting decreases over 50%. **DO NOT APPLY AGAIN** until the sound of cutting starts increasing. I guarantee you will be amazed! Longer life; No pitch buildup; No rusted or pitted bands! A great delivery system is the 12 volt windshield washer assembly out of an old car!

2. "Pam" spray-on vegetable shortening is a great lubrication for 3/4" WIDTH AND UNDER band saw blades on vertical saws. (EXAMPLE: Delta, Grizzly, Jet, etc.) Unplug the machine. Spray Pam vegetable shortening on a rag and wipe on both sides of the blade while turning the upper wheel by hand. You will hear a 50% sound reduction when cutting.

# A band saw blade is a tool. You must lubricate both sides!

In both cases, we know for a fact that lubrication of the body of the band increases band life by over 30%. **Applied sparingly**, you can cut grade lumber with NO staining to your product.

#### The Ron Hanks Dude Ranch

An Account by Mike McElhiney

Imagine a dude ranch for woodworkers and you're well on your way to picturing Ron Hanks' sawmill in Southwest Oregon. Built in the late sixties and early seventies, the sawmill features home made equipment scavenged from a Steinbeck novel. A 160 HP 1930ish Cummins diesel engine powers a 36" blade, the slide that pushes wood through the blade and the sawdust removal chain drive. Wheels from a 1932 Ford truck were cut in half and welded to the trolley that handles the logs. They rotate to help move the log into position and then fall back into the bed of the trolley, flush with the surface. Now defunct sawmills from the thirties and forties supplied much of the equipment still operating in the mill.

All the equipment is housed in a weathered barn like structure built from lumber made from the mill. It is right out of The Grapes of Wrath, but Ron Hanks isn't from Oklahoma. The Hanks family moved to Curry County Oregon (by Gold Beach) in 1880, settled, prospered and bought land. The family still owns hundreds of acres, some farmland, some homes but a great deal of forest. They're loggers mostly.

I first stumbled on the Hanks Myrtlewood sawmill several years ago while on a scouting expedition for turning wood. An absolute newbie, I became entranced with myrtle wood, saw all the factories, went on a tour and then, some bearded guy in the back of the shop told me about Ron Hanks and his mill up the road a piece. Up I went, the directions good, and found Ron, several houses, a barn jam full of myrtle, maple, white oak, walnut and some madrone, although Ron doesn't like it much. Ron showed me some nice myrtlewood – he called it tiger myrtle because it was striped. I bought a 4" x 12" x 48" piece – four bowls. Then I noticed some really interesting maple. Ron took me down to the barn, jumped on a gigantic forklift, moved wood around, and found me the best pieces of curly and quilted maple I've ever seen. Of course, I didn't know that at the time. I just nodded and took his word for it.

I had no idea it would cut like butter, glisten like ripples on a mountain lake, smell like freshly crushed maple leaves in the spring, and finish like a dream. I had no idea what the ripples and burls evident on the sides of the milled lumber portended for the wood within. So I blithely packed about 500\$ worth of wood – bought by the board foot and not by the pound – into my pickup, turned to Ron, handed him my credit card and . . .

"Oh," he said, a smile on his face. "We don't use those here."

"But I only have 100\$ cash," I replied, somewhat chagrinned.

"A check would be fine."

I don't carry checks and never would have thought to do so in a situation like this. I told him as much.

"Don't worry about it," he said. "Just send me a check when you get home."

Just send him a check for 500\$ when I get home to San Diego? Someone he's never seen before, doesn't know from Adam? I was all ready to unload the truck, go find a bank ATM, come back with cash, re-load the truck and move on. I did go to an ATM and I did return with cash for Ron. But my truck was loaded and I felt particularly blessed to have met and had a transaction with someone of Ron's caliber. There are still honorable and trusting souls in the world. They bring out the best in people. Ron is definitely one of them.

So the second time up, I went straight to Ron's place and then straight to the barn. He didn't have much maple from the earlier batch but I managed to cull a solid truckload, sold by the board foot, and started to load it on my truck. But Ron stopped me when he learned I was going to Seattle.

"That wood will split if you don't get it straight home," he warned. "You ought to cover it."

I hadn't considered that. Good idea. Then I thought about my trip to Seattle where I'd be wandering around with a ton of lumber on my rack. Seemed kind of dumb. I ended up leaving the lumber at Ron's place. 430\$. I handed Ron five 100\$ bills.

"Ron," I said. "I'll bet that you'll be able to find me a 70\$ chunk of maple by the time I return to pick up the maple."

"I've already got that," he told me, a big smile on his face.

We went out to the back forty and found a 6' long by 18" diameter chunk of very burly maple. I began to drool. It had to cost a fortune.

"If I don't have to mill this, just cut it in two or something, it's yours for 70\$."

So I went to Seattle, stopping here and there on the way, still looking for that perfect tabletop. No luck. Dropped back by Ron's mill in a week or so, picked up and covered the maple, headed south. Next trip, I'd get a tabletop.

Two weeks later I went up to Oregon again with Jack, a tree trimmer friend of mine, the owner and proprietor of Tree of Life Tree Service, and a man who knows virtually everything there is to know about our local and not so local urban forest and is an artist when it comes to trimming a tree. We shared a rather long drive. Not so bad. But once we got there, it was tough. We had to stay in an inexpensive motel, the Castaway, that overlooked the Oregon coast, we had to eat fresh fish every night at Griff's on the dock, we dealt with incredibly good weather like troopers and suffered through several pieces of smoked salmon. Tough? Yes, but we were determined seekers of wood and willing to put up with hardship.

So on the third day, we found Ron again. He showed me a three-year-old maple log. It was 20' long, 4 feet in diameter and covered with burls. Burls everywhere. And where there are burls there is figured wood beneath. We sliced off an 8 foot long section, or rather Ron did. Then he jumped up on the log, made a couple of cuts at either end to get his bearings, and proceeded with the impossible task of cutting a 8' long, 4' thick maple log in half lengthwise. Took him about three minutes.

That done, Ron mounted the forklift, picked up half the log and headed for the mill. "Look," he told me. "I'm going to cut this log up into slices. 2", 3", 4" – no matter. You make the calls. When we're done, we'll lean the slabs up against the barn and you take what you want."

I like the way Ron does business.

Suffice it to say, that the next four hours were spent pushing maple through the saw, standing up slabs of wood and eventually finding a table top, and some bowls, and some chairs and that piece my friend Joe wanted and . . . Well, you get the idea. Quite a bit of that log went home with me.

This would be an excellent time to take a quick break from reading this enthralling account and go see the youtube video <a href="http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CNAGEB9MP5Q">http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CNAGEB9MP5Q</a>. This is Ron Hanks at his best.

It wasn't noon, and Ron wanted to show us a bit of the countryside. He had another customer due at three so Jack and I drove down to Gold Beach, suffered through a bowl of clam chowder and a couple of fresh crabs, experienced a pirate festival of some kind replete with cannons and lots of Arrrs and Me Heartys, women running around in skimpy pirate damsel garb, scads of food and local crafts! Boring, but we managed. When we came back, Ron was just finishing up with his customer and we piled in his Chevy something or other. It had four-wheel drive and wasn't a pickup. I'm bad with cars. I sat in the back, next to a 30.06 Remington with a scope. Jack got shotgun, and sat next to one in the front seat. Double barreled. We drove by Ron's mother's place to drop something off. The sign on her door read, "Forget about the dog. Worry about the woman with the gun." You definitely want the Hanks family on your side.

We drove a spell, stopped by a dirt road that looked vertical and parked. Ron led the way while Jack and I stumbled along behind. Ron told us he'd been there at first light and had used a power mower to keep the grass short along the wide trail and in the meadows we walked to. He has hunting blinds where he could observe the elk and kept the grazing areas green so the elk would be in the area. You've guessed that Ron is an avid hunter. What you don't know is that he uses a bow. And he gets an elk every year.

Along the way, Ron gave us a lecture on horticulture. We picked chanterelle mushrooms (<a href="http://www.wildmanstevebrill.com/Mushrooms.Folder/The%20Chanterelle.html">http://www.wildmanstevebrill.com/Mushrooms.Folder/The%20Chanterelle.html</a>) while Ron told us how to avoid the bad ones. He pointed out myrtle trees, umpteen kinds of pine, fir, spruce, maple, cypress and so on. I think even Jack was impressed. We found the skeleton of an elk that Ron said had been killed by a mountain lion. He showed us teeth marks on the scapula. Then we spotted a band of elk moving through the trees and we all just stopped and stared at each other for a while. If I had been one of the elk, I'd have run away quickly.

Later that evening, Jack and I had our last dinner at Griff's. They cooked the chanterelle mushrooms for us. None of the usual "Sorry Sir, but regulations don't etc. etc." Instead, the cook came in from the kitchen. The accent? French. "Ohh. Zey smell like apricot," he beamed. When they appeared on our plate a bit later, they fairly melted in our mouths. I had the fresh caught salmon while Jack enjoyed some equally fresh ling cod. The clam chowder is simply amazing with real chunks of clam, no grit – they take care – and it comes in small or large sizes or in a bread bowl. Get the bread bowl. The next day, we loaded up the truck with lumber. Ron gave us a jar of cooked elk, promised to have a better selection of maple next time – if that is possible – and handed me a 4' x 2" plank that he said he'd forgotten about. Quilted and burl maple wood. A freebie. Yes. I am going back. Not in September, 'cause that's when Ron hunts. But in October or November.

#### **CONDITIONS OF ENTRY**

- Who can enter? The Design in Wood Exhibition is open to all interested adult woodworkers. Wood projects must have been created by the artist whose name appears on the entry form.
- How many entries can I submit? A maximum of three entries, all classes combined, may be submitted per entrant. Works previously displayed in this Exhibition are not eligible.
- Is there a fee? The processing fee is \$20.00 per wood project entered. Processing fees are non-refundable.
- How do I enter? Registration is required. Late entries will not be accepted. No faxes.
- On-line registration: Entries must be submitted at www.sdfair.com/entry by 11:59pm (Pacific Daylight Time) on Friday, May 3, 2013. On-line entries will receive an email confirmation. Technical support will not be available after 7:00pm, on May 3, 2013 for online registration.
- **Mail in registration:** Completed forms and fees must be USPS postmarked on or before May 3, 2013. You will not receive a return receipt.
- **Hand delivered registration:** Completed forms and fees must be delivered to the Entry Office, Del Mar Fairgrounds on or before May 3, 5:00pm.
- What are the project requirements?
  - Projects that do not adhere to the requirements specified will be disallowed.
  - Projects, any portion of which was produced under the supervision of an instructor or those constructed from kits, are not eligible.
  - Mail in and hand delivered entry forms must be accompanied by 4" x 6" color photos, with no more than three views per entry. Each photo must show the entrant's name and item number to correspond to the entry form. Photos will not be returned. Photos of unassembled projects are not acceptable. On-line entries will be prompted to submit photos electronically.

#### **Restrictions:**

Entries that are unsuitable or require excessive display space may be disallowed by Fair Management. Entries must be primarily made of wood. Entries will be juried for acceptance into the show.

When do I deliver my exhibits? Notification of your participation will be mailed prior to the delivery date. See calendar for delivery date and times. You must bring the projects described on the entry form. Claim checks will be issued when delivered.

- **Shipping Instructions:** Small exhibits may be shipped, pre-paid, to arrive at the San Diego County Fair Entry Office between May 23 and May 29, 2013.

- **For return shipping of entries**, a pre-paid return label from the shipper (UPS or USPS) **must** be included with your entry.
- When do I pick up my exhibits? All exhibits must be picked up on date and time specified in calendar. Exhibits may not be withdrawn before the close of the Fair. You must present your claim checks in order to pick up your exhibits. If you are unable to come during specified time, please arrange for someone else to pick up your exhibits. That person must bring the claim checks and a signed, written authorization from you. Exhibits not picked up at this time become the property of the Fair and will be disposed of promptly.
- How can I sell my work? All work on display will be considered for sale at the price indicated on the entry form. Work not for sale must be marked NFS on the entry form. Work not priced will be considered NFS. Sales inquiries will be collected and passed to the exhibitor when entries are picked up. No sales are allowed during the Fair. All sales will be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- What is the judging procedure? Judging panels will consist of woodworkers and professionals in the industry. The following judging criteria will be used for all classes: Design Integrity; Understanding and Use of Materials; Use of Form and Color; Overall Craftsmanship; and Appearance and Quality of Finish. All selected entries and award-winning works will be displayed during the run of the Fair. The decision of the judges is final
- What else do I need to know? No entry will be accepted should the exhibitor describe conditions under which he/she will exhibit.
