

President's Message

President's Message July 2013

The 32nd edition of the Design in Wood Exhibition at the San Diego County Fair will close this month after another successful run. Once again the variety and quality of more than 300 entries was impressive. I hope you had a chance to see it. The first Design in Wood Exhibition was held in 1982 and was closely tied to the founding of SDFWA. The first two SDFWA presidents, Jim Cherry and Lynn Rybarczyk along with Chuck Masters and Richard Griebe were instrumental in creating that first show which comprised 45 examples of fine woodworking selected from a total of 100 entries, all submitted by SDFWA members. I found a collection of photos from the 1982 show in our archives and selected two of them for the newsletter. I wonder if any long time member might identify the makers, as the photos were not labeled.

This year 47 SDFWA members out of a total of 128 contributors entered pieces in the show. The quality of our member's work made it difficult to select only six to receive a first, second or third place President's Awards in both novice and advanced class. Here is a list of the winners.

Novice Class (has not previously won an award) First Place: Terry Sullivan / Cherry Rocker Second Place: Albert Tamayo / Stereo Cabinet Third Place: Jose Antonio Alcantar / Blackfeet Indians

Advanced Class (has previously won an award) First Place: David Marr / Small Buffet Second Place: David O. Wade / Sideboard Third Place: William T. Bardick / Free Standing Mirror

We are justifiably proud that our Design in Wood Exhibition is so highly regarded that we attract entries from a wide variety of woodworkers, many from distant locations. SDFWA members, however, account for only a third of the total contributors to the show. I'm not sure why this is. I remember feeling terribly

insecure about having my work compared to that of some genuine master craftsmen when I first entered a piece in 2002. Every year since I still sweated over minute (and not so minute) flaws that are probably



invisible to anyone else. But the inspiration gained from being in the company of really fine woodworkers is priceless and the pressure to produce something worthy has made me a better craftsman over the years. No one ever said anything unkind about my work and I received some valuable advice and guidance about details that would otherwise have escaped my notice.

I encourage every member who is able to seriously consider entering the show next year. It can be a great experience.

The July program will be by your program chair, Del Cover and will show the design, layup and construction of a classic gothic chair similar to the throne side chairs in HBO's True Blood.

This is a classic renaissance chair that is constructed like the midsection of a ships framing. This is a commission by a client that will have carving on the back and ends and a leather cushion by Patrick Edwards. The ribs will be built up similar to ship construction with long bolts aligning everything. My chair will be a heavier construction with a straight back incorporating a triad of triskel designs. An example of an original in the Metropolitan Museum of art dates from the 15th century, Italy.

The meeting will be on Wednesday, July 31 at 7PM in the Al Bahr Temple, located at 5440 Kearny Mesa Rd. (behind the Hampton Inn)

But I disagree and so do the crew that has taken responsibility for the piece. The example you set by touching your work at the fair gives John Q. Public the wrong idea. It makes the work of the DIW crew that much more difficult.

I want someone with white gloves touching the furniture or artwork I bring to the fair. That shows respect. The Docents or the DIW people trained to display features of the furniture on display wear gloves when



they open a drawer. This shows the general public that they are not at Jeromes Furniture. DIW is special and they are in the presence of spectacular workmanship. And when I go down to pick up my furniture, I know that it will be in precisely the same condition as when I delivered it.

When I bring it home, I'll have to worry that the cat will scratch it while playing or someone will set a drink on the table and leave a ring. But while my work is at DIW it is safe. No worries. And is fun when working there to go and ask someone with white gloves to show a member of the public some particularly clever thing you have done.

Bob Stevenson growls now and then. I'm all for it. I want him and his crew on my side. If Bob or Tom or Ron or Beryl or Don or Sharon or any one of the team growls, be assured, it is because they care about you and your work. They are professionals. They have my thanks.


2013 Fall Seminar

Frank Klausz is back for another Seminar. He will be building a small table using a combination of hand and power tools. He is targeting this lecture and demonstration at the typical home



craftsman. He will be using hand and power tools that you would find in a typical serious home shop. Besides his usual "pearls of wisdom" as he lectures, he will be demonstrating mortise and tenon, tapered legs, building and fitting

a drawer and half blind and through hand cut dovetails. He tells me that he has a new way of showing how to hand cut a mortise and tenon that will easily explain how to accurately cut this joint. Plans for building your own table will be



available for attendees.

Frank is a very successful furniture maker and still runs a cabinet and furniture making shop in New Jersey. Frank is true "Master Woodworker" in all the time-honored meaning of the word. He was traditionally trained, having completed his ap-





prenticeship in Europe under another master woodworker, his father. He started his learning at age 14 and at the end of four years, Frank became a certified journeyman cabinetmaker, on his way to becoming a master (which required one year of work in each of three different shops). He is very well known for his hand cut dovetails and has one of the first videos showing his technique. Plans for the table will be available for attendees. It is a real treat to have Frank back again. You

Beautiful handmade wooden toys donated to RSF Library

The Rancho Santa Fe Library was recently the recipient of 100 handmade wooden toys from the San Diego Fine Woodworkers Association, according to member Jim Vitale, who personally delivered the trains, cars, baby doll cradles and high chairs. A group of 50 retired craftsmen make and build the toys to donate to local organizations.

This year they are donating toys to all of the county and city libraries. They also recently made donations to the Del Mar Library and plan to visit the Carmel Valley Library. They also hope to donate to local Head Start programs, a program that provides preschool for children of low-income fami-

The Woodworkers Association currently has 1,500 members, both hobbyists and wood professionals. Vitale himself is a hobbyist, working as a life insurance agent in La Jolla and recently taking up his woodworking again. He has been in charge of selecting toy recipients and delivering the toy haul like a spring Santa Claus.

The group of 50 toymakers work with donated wood. The scraps of quality wood come from a variety of sources, from local cabinet carpenters to guitar makers.

The toymakers take

great care to make sure that the toys are safe - they use non-toxic paint on the wood and they ensure all of the pieces are big enough so they can't be swallowed.

The toy that the toymakers make the most of are race cars - last year they sent 100 race cars to children in Afghanistan. They have also delivered toys to Tijuana but place

an emphasis on gifting to local nonprofits.


"This is one of the neater toys they make," said Vitale of a train with an engine carefully constructed to link four train



Some thoughts on the smells associated with our favorite medium.

Sugar Pine is friendly, mellowed with honey, and exudes a sweet, sociable, woodsy odor that hangs in the air like a forest on a warm day. In grainy red oak, there lurks a brittle and acrid scent that bites but is as mysteriously pleasing as the wood is to behold. White oak, a creamy gray rather than white, is meaner, harder and more closegrained than its red cousin with a sharper and less friendly scent, but still pleasing to the eye. Close grained, featureless Baltic birch is annoyingly sharp and dry with qualities that include watery eyes and sneezing. Maple, famous for honey col-

ored, shimmering bird's eyes, has a smooth odor with just a hint of sweetness and cuts just like it smells, if the plane's blade is sharp, making thin, tight curls on the floor of a woodshop. Olive wood is rare and complicated, with pinks, grays, tans and golds blending in intricate harmonies, wood which smells when cut, like fermented olive oil, rich and heady, as full of flavor as the wood is full of color. And there is teak. Soft, golden teak, a greasy, forgiving wood that works like a dream, plays with the nose and invades the lungs with oily dust. The smell is rich, cloying, and unless you were raised in the jungles of Malaysia, as undeniably foreign as paprika.
