Also in February, there was a Mentor Class by Bob Stevenson on drawer making. Bob is making great progress in his efforts to reinvigorate the Mentor Program.

You may have seen the news on TV or the report in U-T San Diego, but if not, a group led by Mike McElhiney recently created and gifted an 8 ft. dining table for the crew of SD Fire Station 27. Beautiful iron bark eucalyptus donated by Dale Stauffer was used to create this exceptional piece as an expression of thanks for the great work done by the firemen in saving the home of an elderly couple, who are neighbors of Mike. We have also learned that another fire station would appreciate it if we could undertake building dining tables for their station. The station house is grand, but the dining accommodations are not. Usually they are able to fell the tree or it has already fallen and would like to see the wood utilized rather than hauled off to the dump. Also, we get inquiries about helping to dispose of the contents of a shop; often the unfortunate result of a loved one's passing. 

Volunteering at Design in Wood

The visitors were so polite and friendly, smiling with us and willing to chat about their woodworking experiences on many different levels of expertise. The SDFWA members assisted us with any questions we had and were warm and very appreciative of our help that day. We both hope to go back to the Fair soon to offer our assistance once more. Other than chasing one young person out for eating a foot-long hot dog on the indoor premises and having slightly sore feet at the end of the day, our experience enhanced our passion for learning more about the fine art of woodworking. Mike McElhiney's Report on Fire House Table Project:

It is a cliché, but sometimes a disaster does bring out the best in us. It certainly brought out the best in George and Roseline and in those lucky enough to know them. And it brought Engine 27 to our neighborhood.

Having your house catch fire just before Christmas must rate pretty high on anyone's disaster list. George and Roseline, a 90 year old couple who had lived in their house since the early 50s, found themselves on the street as a leaky gas pipe fed a rapidly growing fire. Within minutes flames were leaping from windows and a plume of dark smoke rose into the air. Just minutes after the 911 call by a neighbor, Engine 27 rolled down the street and took charge. They did what firemen do: they put out the fire, they tended to the needs of George and Roseline, involved social services, found them a place to stay, and did everything in their power to save the structure. They succeeded. That is what they do.

George and Roseline are back in the neighborhood now. They had the courage and fortitude to rebuild and used the disaster to improve their lives. Their positive attitude toward the fire and its aftermath left me with a desire to do something for the crew that, day after day, helps others. Not just with house fires, but with medical emergencies, brush fires in the canyons and any sudden calamity that can befall any of us. Got a serious problem? Who you gonna call?

So when Jim Strawn, our raffle master, mentioned that the City of SD Fire Department – the big one downtown – wanted some tables built to replace some elderly and very ratty ones, something clicked for me. I drove by the Clairemont Station #27, walked in, met the crew and checked out their table. It was 1947 institutional gray ugly Formica, 8'x3' large and probably indestructible. They could use a table.

I started to push the project at SDFWA board meetings and managed to interest our current VP, Dale Stauffer, enough that he donated some spectacular iron bark eucalyptus to the cause. The trestle table required about 60bf of lumber. Dale's lumber stash consisted of 8' long planks, about 1 ¼" thick, very rough and the ends of the lumber, stored for 10 years in the back yard, were split. I'd have to add breadboard ends to make an eight foot table top.

With the wood in hand, the project was underway. I stopped by Station #27 once again and was lucky enough to meet Captain Ronnie Dizon. We talked table. He made the mistake of sending me an email and has been my main contact and a veritable fount of information and help during this process. Continued next page

The search for volunteers was short. People just volunteered. Jim Thompson, my neighbor, was always there for lifting. Advice on finishing and lifting was also supplied by Kim Sands who lives a few doors up from George. The most help, of course, came from members of the SDFWA. Lou Adzima filmed and took pictures of all kinds of things. Don Spangler sanded and finished as did Anna Martin. Clare Pister brought a friend to help me carry HEAVY wood to my truck. And then Clare went on to arrange everything for the party: bake cookies, bring her sister to help, etc., etc., a whirlwind that girl. Jeff Bratt sanded, helped attach the skirt to the tabletop, and was there often with lifting help and advice. Don got roped into planning this event and did his usual stellar job. Dale Stauffer, our VP in charge of goodness, donated some Iron Bark Eucalyptus that defies description. Besides being HEAVY it has color and figure that is unrivaled. This is good stuff. Look, you guys distract Dale and I'll go get the rest of the wood. I'll share, maybe.

Carlos Gonzalez Velez contributed his large brain and quite a bit of brawn to master the CNC machine at MakerPlace. We could not have done the table without first surfacing the material because the Iron Bark Eucalyptus was rock hard. Dale said it was case hardened in the kiln drying process. Carlos showed me the CNC surfacing ropes and stayed for hours helping get this wood ready for making a table. Dan Heck stepped forward to help make pens and ended up making all of them. I had the relatively easy task of taking the pens to MakerPlace and using the laser to put names on them. Lucky there were extra pens. I made two mistakes. Sorry, Dan.

I managed to make a lazy Susan from a piece of Torrey Pine I had lying around and silk screened 10 shirts for the crew at #27 with their new, but not yet approved, logo.

Delivery day was Sunday the 8th of February and we had a party. The fire truck showed up at 3:00pm along with about thirty people from the neighborhood and SDFWA. Don Spangler, Celeste and Jeff Bratt arrived with chairs, tables and goodies. KUSI showed up in the form of Taylor Schuss, who filmed everything. The party was a rousing success: the table got delivered, Public Relations had a good day, and all was well with the world.

The best part of this whole process for me was meeting and getting to put a face on the guys who drive around in fire trucks. Ronnie and his crew are some really good people and now, whenever I hear a siren in the distance, I know it is them or someone like them going to help some needy person or family as fast as they can. A special thanks to Engine 27 and its crew!

Member Bill Collins Pro bono Work

This is a small toy box we made for Rady Children's Hospital to hold toys they use as rewards for children undergoing treatment.

It's made from solid cherry, and has soft-closing hinges to protect little fingers. It has received five coats of thinned oil-based polyurethane applied with a cloth, with wet sanding between coats using 400, then 600 and finally 800 grit wet or dry sandpaper and mineral spirits. It will be polished a couple of days after this final coat with Watco liquid wax.



DIW Chair Shop Delivery

Today was a blast. I delivered four chairs to Kathy Smith's fourth grade classroom at the Calvary Christian Academy in Chula Vista. Kathy greeted me with bubbling appreciation and her class recited "Good morning Mr. Bob" in unison. Kathy said she wanted her class to experience what wood is and what it feels like. They are currently studying the Revolutionary War period. I told the class that the chairs are modeled after a 200 year old child's chair that was in Pat Edward's shop, and that we've been making them for 17 years. I mentioned our nineteenth century chair shop at the fair and asked if anyone knew when the nineteenth century was. Many hands went up and a young man said "the eighteen hundreds." Kathy got my mailing address and said she'll have her class send a thank you letter to the association.

I then took four chairs to Dan Brown, the nurse at the UCSD burn intensive care unit. Dan is the fellow who was the subject of Ron Rossi's note concerning an unfilled request from 2013. When I initially contacted Dan, he was very excited to hear from me. When I arrived at the burn unit today, he greeted me enthusiastically and gave me a VIP tour of their unit. The chairs were put in place in a waiting room that doubles as a children's play room. I set them around a little video game table whose top was considerably taller than appropriate for the chairs. Dan had mentioned that he has wooden blocks for his child patients to play with, so I saw they have a need for a table to go with the chairs. I called Martin this afternoon, and he said he has parts for a table. He and I are going to do joinery and assembly of this table starting Thursday, Feb 26 in his shop. When I called Dan this evening and told him we're making him a table, he called me an angel (catch in my throat). When I deliver this table, Dan will ask me for a list of the people who worked on the chairs so that he can have a thank vou letter written on behalf of the burn center. When I receive a thank you letter, I will share it with the membership.

Maple; Hard and Soft

I recently became curious about how to distinguish between the hardwoods described as hard and soft maple. I would like to share the following information which was collected from several sources on the Internet.

The term "Soft Maple" does not refer to any specific species of maple, but rather, is a broad term which includes several different species. "Soft Maple" is merely used to differentiate all of these species from Hard Maple.

Hard Maple (commonly called Rock Maple or Sugar Maple), on the other hand, typically refers to one specific species: Acer saccharum (the tree which is tapped to get maple syrup). Besides Acer saccharum, one other species is sometimes considered in the grouping of Hard Maple in the United States. This is <u>Black Maple (Acer nigrum)</u>, which is so closely related to Hard Maple that some even consider it to be a sub-species of the same tree, classifying it as: Acer saccharum subsp. nigrum.

Depending on where you live, several different species might be sold as Soft Maple. In Oregon, the Soft Maple you buy (if it has been harvested locally) will likely be <u>Bigleaf Maple</u>, while in the eastern United States you may actually be buying <u>Red Maple</u> or <u>Silver Maple</u>. There is a rivalry for which is superior between

advocates of Bigfleaf Maple on the west coast, and Red Maple fans on the east coast.

Two other common species of maple that fall under the grouping of Soft Maple are: <u>Box Elder (Acer negundo)</u> and <u>Striped Maple (Acer pensylvanicum)</u>. Each of these species has their own characteristics regarding strength, hardness, weight, etc. But overall, they are not as hard or as strong as Hard Maple.

Obviously the trees referred to as soft are not as hard as Hard Maple. But what is the actual difference in hardness between the several species mentioned

above? It turns out there is a system of quantitative measurement of the hardness of different wood species. It is based on something called the Janka Scale. The Janka Scale is based on a test which measures the actual hardness of wood. Ratings are determined by using the Janka Hardness Test which measures the force required to drive a .444 inch steel ball into a sample of wood until half its diameter is embedded in the wood. Testing on the surface of a plank perpendicular to the grain is said to be a measurement of "side hardness". Results are stated in various ways: poundsforce in the U.S., kilograms-force in Sweden and either newtons or kilonewtons in Australia. But the most useful way is to state the results in relative numerical units, eg. 660 Janka. Hardness varies with the direction of wood grain in which the measurement is taken but results almost always refer to "side testing". However the test is done and whatever units are used, the higher the number the harder the wood. This is one of the best measures of the ability of wood species to withstand denting and wear. It is also a good indicator of how hard a species is to mill or work with hand tools.

Because hardness may vary depending on when and where the wood is harvested, the Janka rating should only be used as a general guide when comparing various species of wood. The Janka Hardness Scale has become the industry standard for determining whether a given wood is suitable for flooring material. Red Oak, which has a Janka rating of 1290, is the industry benchmark for comparing the relative hardness of different wood species.

The following results are from tests performed by the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM). The hardest wood tested is one I have never heard of, Australian Buloke, which is rated at 5060 Janka units. For comparison, Lignum Vitae is rated at 4500, Brazilian Ebony at 3692, Black Walnut and Cherry nearly identical at 1023 and 1010 respectively and Balsa at 100.

Brian began turning wood in 2000 and was a finish carpenter by trade. In 2008, the SD Woodturners held a demonstration of an MDF rose engine. This inspired Brian to first build his own MDF rose engine and then several months later, he ordered a large, metal rose engine from Fred Armbruster. Fred Armbruster, a New England retina surgeon, was building a batch of 26 rose engines. He ordered one and in 2009 Mr. Armbruster came to the west coast and assembled his lathe, an Armbruster Mark II. In 2014, Mr. Armbruster was kind enough to let Brian emulate his Mark II in order to build his own, homemade rose engine. Brian spent eleven weeks, worked every day and completed his own metal rose engine. In the accompanying photos, this lathe has the polycarbonate discs.

The rose engine is a very special ornamental turning lathe. The term rose engine comes from the way some of the patterns look that can be turned on the lathe; people thought they resembled roses. The particular type of rose engine Mr. Armbruster used as a prototype is a Holtzapffel and his is named the Armbruster Mark II. While we were all admiring the lathe, Mike Switalski, the SDFWA Magazine Sales chairperson, mentioned that he knew about an article on Mr. Armbruster and the Holtzapffel lathe, which he kindly emailed it to me. The article is from Wood Magazine, December 1998 and I highly recommend it. Perhaps you can pick up a copy at the next meeting, or, if you can't find it, try going to www.holtzapffel.org . This website provides a great deal of information on the ornamental lathes built by the Holtzapffel family beginning in the 1700's.

Brian has a wonderful gallery in his home in which he displays some of his work. He told us that the pieces made on the rose engine lathe are not sanded after they come off the lathe. Sanding would damage the very fine details. He does use oil and wax to achieve the finish you see in the photos. How fine are the details in ornamental lathe turnings? In my opinion they are as fine as those of a metal lathe. Brian has heard of judges using a jeweler's loupe to examine pieces. Some of Brian's work is shown in del Mano and Idyllwild Galleries.

As I left the tour, I half expected to see Phileas Fogg and his faithful servant Passepartout step out of the Victorian age and into Brian's shop to order something. www.jacksonwoodworks.com




